

1 ANNOUNCER: We will do a brief presentation, Mark and Melissa will take care of 2 3 that, and then we will open up the mic for comments. We are going to try to get it so that everyone who 4 5 wants to make a comment has a chance to do that 6 before you circle back around. The other thing is if 7 you're like me and you wake up in the middle of the 8 night thinking gosh, I wish I said that, you have a week to either mail or e-mail comments to us. 9 All of 10 them are equally valid, all of them carry the same 11 weight, we just need them by April 15 to get them in 12 the final document. So with that I will turn it over 13 to Mark and Melissa. MS. CLOW: Good evening. I am Melissa 14 15 Clow, the special projects administrator with Iowa 16 City. And I am just going to revisit for any of you

17 who don't know, I'm sure most of you do, what the 18 issues are for this project and why we are looking at 19 elevating Dubuque Street and Park Road Bridge. 20 We will be addressing the following issues: Historic 21 floods. In 1993 the road was closed for 60 days; and 22 then in 2008 it was closed for 30 days. And Park 23 Road Bridge was closed, in addition to Dubuque 24 Street, causing backwater all the way up to the Iowa 25 Power River Dam.

| 1 | Almost on a yearly basis we do experience |
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| 2 | seasonal flooding along Dubuque Street. We almost |
| 3 | saw it this year. We've had flooding in the medians |
| 4 | quite a bit, but that appears to be coming down. |
| 5 | Anytime we have rains an inch or more per hour, you |
| 6 | will see flooding and closures on the northbound |
| 7 | Dubuque Street lanes. |
| 8 | We also have a number of infrastructure |
| 9 | issues along Dubuque Street that will need to be |
| 10 | taken care of whether or not we raise Dubuque. That |
| 11 | includes the pavement, it is over 30 years old. And |
| 12 | also turning lanes from Dubuque to Park Road. And |
| 13 | we're looking at dual turn lanes from Park Road to |
| 14 | Dubuque Street. |
| 15 | Talking about Park Road Bridge, it is |
| 16 | functionally deficient. We would be looking at deck |
| 17 | repair and there are also a number of safety issues |
| 18 | with their pedestrian codes and barriers that are |
| 19 | required now that currently do not exist. |
| 20 | Real quick I will touch on the project |
| 21 | purpose and need. This is our third and final |
| 22 | meeting for the planning process for the |
| 23 | environmental assessment. And our first step, if you |
| 24 | remember, was to establish this purpose and need. |
| 25 | The reason for the project will be to increase the |

| 1 | reliability of Dubuque Street, increase the |
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| 2 | reliability of Park Road Bridge, reduce that |
| 3 | backwater I talked about, and also improve the |
| 4 | infrastructure. |
| 5 | We will be taking a complete streets |
| 6 | approach to the project and we want to maintain this |
| 7 | park-like and unique setting that we have coming in |
| 8 | to Iowa City. |
| 9 | The one thing to note about this project is |
| 10 | that it is the one flood protection project that will |
| 11 | reduce the flood water elevations of the river. |
| 12 | Taking a look at the schedule really quick. Like I |
| 13 | said this is the last step of phase one and the |
| 14 | planning process. This is the big picture. For many |
| 15 | of you we have not gotten in to the fine details, the |
| 16 | final engineering, and we are hoping to start that in |
| 17 | the next month or two. That will be phase two. |
| 18 | We're looking at a year for final design. |
| 19 | That will include kind of the look of the project and |
| 20 | the landscape plan as well. And then phase three |
| 21 | will be two construction seasons in 2014 and 2015. |
| 22 | And with that I will turn it over to Mark Pearson. |
| 23 | MR. PEARSON: Thanks. Just before we get |
| 24 | going with the comment period I thought we would walk |
| 25 | through what the preferred alternative is that you |
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| 1 | have probably seen in the document, that you may have |
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| 2 | been talking with folks from the city or from the |
| 3 | consultant staff this evening. |
| 4 | Starting with Dubuque Street, a couple |
| 5 | features related to that. As Melissa mentioned we |
| 6 | will be elevating the street. The change in |
| 7 | elevation will begin at the Foster Road intersection |
| 8 | and will tie back in with the existing elevation near |
| 9 | Brown Street. In that stretch the changes in |
| 10 | elevation will range anywhere from a foot upwards of |
| 11 | 15 feet, especially near the Mayflower entrance and |
| 12 | as you get down to Kimball Road. |
| 13 | So it will be a higher street but it |
| 14 | follows the same alignment pretty much as it does |
| 15 | now, with the noted exception that in the vicinity of |
| 16 | Mayflower, between there and Foster, we have proposed |
| 17 | moving the alignment a little bit to the west towards |
| 18 | the park and away from the residents, from basically |
| 19 | Kimball or from Park Road north through that |
| 20 | corridor. |
| 21 | During this time we will also be |
| 22 | constructing a number of, as Melissa has mentioned, |
| 23 | amenities related to the complete streets concepts. |
| 24 | So things like the bus and transit stops that are |
| 25 | there currently in the project, we will maintain |
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will be a ten-foot multi-use path.

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| those either close to or at their exact location. We |
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| are going to work to build new trails and sidewalks |
| so that the trail that is along the west side of |
| Dubuque Street currently will be replaced. It might |
| be in a slightly different location, it might be a |
| different elevation, but it is going to be there. It |

8 On the eastern side of Dubuque Street there will be new sidewalk along the whole corridor. 9 On 10 Park Road Bridge there will be, in addition to the 11 five travel lanes for traffic, there will be two 12 10-foot multi-use paths so you'll have more room for 13 bicycle and pedestrian traffic on the bridge. And as 14 Melissa also mentioned, those will have additional 15 safety features to keep that traffic separate from 16 the pedestrians and bicyclists.

Another feature related to the longer Park Road Bridge that we have proposed will be the ability for users of the sidewalks and trails to actually pass underneath the west side of the bridge so that you're not facing a great crossing to get, say, from, the Hancher side to the city park side.

One other aspect that I should mention is that if you have existing driveway access on Dubuque Street today, when we're done with the project you

| 1 | will still have driveway access. We made a concerted |
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| 2 | effort to keep those. It might be, again, slightly |
| 3 | different, and we'll work those details out over the |
| 4 | next year, but again if you have driveway access |
| 5 | today you'll have it when we're done. |
| 6 | And also existing intersections with Ridge, |
| 7 | Taft Speedway, the entrance to the boathouse and |
| 8 | Terrell Mill Park will also be maintained. Again, |
| 9 | they will be slightly different but it will look very |
| 10 | much the same when we're done. |
| 11 | A little bit about the bridge. We're |
| 12 | proposing to have a steel or concrete girder bridge. |
| 13 | Similar probably in terms of construction type to the |
| 14 | new bridge that is on the south side of town I'm |
| 15 | drawing a blank, on the name McCallister. We |
| 16 | don't know what it is going to look like yet but we |
| 17 | do know that we're proposing a slightly longer |
| 18 | bridge, about 450 long instead of 300 feet. And it |
| 19 | will be a wider bridge because it will accommodate an |
| 20 | additional travel lane. We'll have five 12-foot |
| 21 | travel lanes for traffic, and then the additional |
| 22 | multi-use paths on either side of the bridge that I |
| 23 | mentioned before. |
| 2.4 | It is going to have similar transit access |

24 It is going to have similar transit access 25 in the vicinity of the bridge or on the bridge. Also

| 1 | some aspect that Melissa mentioned, there will be no |
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| 2 | backwater caused by this new bridge. In fact, it |
| 3 | will have the net effect of reducing backwater that |
| 4 | was caused by the current bridge. We will be able to |
| 5 | do that by having fewer piers in the water. We will |
| 6 | be able to do that by having a longer span with the |
| 7 | abutments that are pulled further back to give the |
| 8 | water more room to pass. And it will be a higher |
| 9 | bridge than the current one. But the net effect of |
| 10 | that is that it minimizes or completely eliminates |
| 11 | any backwater whatsoever that the current bridge |
| 12 | causes. |
| 13 | And that kind of concludes the |
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| 14 | presentation. Really the focus of this session is to |

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| 2 | chance to make their initial comment, if you want to |
| 3 | add something new feel free to do that. |
| 4 | We'll get set up here in just a second. |
| 5 | And then if anybody has a comment that you want to |
| 6 | make on the mic, all we do is ask that you step up, |
| 7 | please state your name and what your address is so we |
| 8 | know who you are. And we have a court reporter here |
| 9 | tonight. She'll transcribe it verbatim and then we |
| 10 | have that record of this. So we will get going with |
| 11 | that in just a second. |
| 12 | And it is real simple, if you want to make |
| 13 | a comment, step on up, state your name, residence. |
| 14 | And if you don't want to make a comment, that's fine |
| 15 | too. We can stick around a little bit later and |
| 16 | continue with the open house. It doesn't carry any |
| 17 | more weight than it does if you send us an e-mail or |
| 18 | write it down in the comment table back there. It is |
| 19 | just another means of making your comment heard, |
| 20 | so don't be shy. |
| 21 | MS. CLINE: My name is Sally Cline, I live |
| 22 | at 33 Trevose, Idlyllwild. It is just a question and |
| 23 | I hope you can answer it. But we have heard over the |
| 24 | past almost five years that Mayflower is going to |
| 25 | actually have a flood wall in front of its building. |
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1 So if that is correct, then do we see Dubuque Street 2 below that or even to? MS. CLOW: Yes, Mayflower is doing their 3 own separate flood mitigation project and that will 4 5 begin at the end of the current semester, so they'll 6 be starting this summer. 7 So we were trying to coincide the projects 8 together, but they will be starting this summer, we 9 will start next summer. They are going to have a 10 permanent wall and create a patio up there. On top 11 of the wall they'll have an invisible flood wall 12 which essentially is the removable panels that will 13 go in on top of it. MS. CLINE: That is in front of some of the 14 15 University buildings, the art buildings? 16 MS. CLOW: Yes, so they'll be protected to 17 the 500-year flood elevation plus two feet. And our 18 environmental assessment is proposing the roadway to 19 be at the 500 plus one foot, so the roadway would be 20 above their first floor by a few feet. 21 MS. WALL: I am Mary Wall. I live on Ridge 22 I have lived here since 1960. And I have been Road. 23 mouthing off about this for a long time so I thought 24 maybe I better come and be informed about what it is. 25 Ever since 1960 parts of Dubuque Street have gone

| 1 | under water every single year. In '93, in 2008 it |
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| 2 | was much more than usual. But I was joking in saying |
| 3 | what are they going to do, build a causeway with an |
| 4 | off ramp on the second floor to the Mayflower? |
| 5 | As I look at the plans and the things that |
| 6 | the engineering firm here has thought, I'm really |
| 7 | gratified. I'm glad I came tonight. I know that the |
| 8 | money is an awful lot of money, but I think in the |
| 9 | long run when things are done it looks to me like |
| 10 | they thought it out well and there probably will be a |
| 11 | great deal of improvement. That's all I wanted to |
| 12 | say. |
| 13 | MS. OWEN: My name is Daissy Owen and I |
| 14 | live at 2 Bella Vista Place. I have been there since |
| 15 | 1974, so I am very close to where your work is going |
| 16 | to be. My concern is when are you going to quit the |
| 17 | noise every day? Is it going to be a 24/7, or are we |
| 18 | going to have some time to be able to rest from the |
| 19 | noise? |
| 20 | MS. CLOW: We do have a city noise |
| 21 | ordinance. And Ron, if I'm mistaken please correct |
| 22 | me, from 7:00 to 10:00 p.m. But we realize this is a |
| 23 | residential area so we will be enforcing more strict |
| 24 | ordinance that the noisy work be done at a proper |
| 25 | time. |

MS. OWEN: Yes, because we will be 1 2 listening to the noise all day, we will be -- you 3 know, we need some time to rest at night. 4 MS. CLOW: Right. And there may be a few 5 times where we need to shut down the road entirely to 6 raise grade and meet intersections to keep the road 7 open, so there may be a few periods where there would 8 be longer hours of work, but you would be notified well in advance and we will be communicating with you 9 10 when that would happen. 11 MS. OWEN: Thank you. 12 MR. KNOCHE: So there are times when we do 13 pour pavement and we have to cut in joints in that 14 pavement, make sure it doesn't crack early and make 15 sure it cracks where we want it to. If they're 16 pouring a pavement during the day and they get out 17 there and they're ready to saw cut at 3:00 in the 18 morning, that's when they'll have to be out there saw 19 cutting. So there may be some times when there'll be 20 some early morning, late evening types of work going 21 on, but we'll keep you informed of when that work is 22 going to occur. 23 MS. CLOW: So it would be one early 24 morning, not three or four in a row? 25 MR. KNOCHE: Correct. It could be later

| 1 | than yes, it could be after that 10:00 p.m., |
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| 2 | between that 10:00 p.m. and that 7:00 a.m. timeframe. |
| 3 | I just want to make sure we don't make any promises |
| 4 | we can't hold up to, so |
| 5 | MR. GEERDES: Greg Geerdes, 890 Park Place |
| 6 | in Iowa City. |
| 7 | More of a question than a comment. When |
| 8 | you're raising the roadway the 5 to 15 feet that |
| 9 | you're contemplating, do you need to build a |
| 10 | retaining wall or anything along the riverside, or do |
| 11 | you have enough space to preserve the bank with this |
| 12 | new sill on top of it? |
| 13 | MS. CLOW: We will be building a retaining |
| 14 | wall between the bridge and Terrell Mill Park, |
| 15 | because we are very restricted in space there. And |
| 16 | to maintain the pedestrian way and create room for a |
| 17 | sidewalk on the east side we will need a retaining |
| 18 | wall. |
| 19 | MR. GEERDES: I can understand why you |
| 20 | would need to do that. The only point I would make |
| 21 | is I hope you pay attention to the aesthetics of that |
| 22 | because that's a big deal. |
| 23 | MS. CLOW: Definitely. |
| 24 | MR. GEERDES: And I note that you are |
| 25 | probably going to be tearing up the median between |
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| 1 | the north and the south lanes, so I would strongly |
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| 2 | encourage you to coordinate the aesthetics and the |
| 3 | landscaping of this whole corridor. |
| 4 | MS. CLOW: Yes, the aesthetics are very |
| 5 | important to us and we want to maintain the unique |
| 6 | look it has right now we want to maintain. The |
| 7 | retaining wall we do understand that you're going to |
| 8 | be able to view that from city park, so the |
| 9 | aesthetics of that is going to be very important as |
| 10 | well. |
| 11 | MR. GEERDES: Because that would be really |
| 12 | a bad deal if you didn't do it right, so |
| 13 | MS. CLOW: Right. |
| 14 | MR. GEERDES: Thank you. |
| 15 | MR. COULTER: I'm Joe Coulter, I live at |
| 16 | 1818 North Dubuque. That's my garage that's buried |
| 17 | over there right across the street. |
| 18 | As I understand, the present northbound |
| 19 | lane of Dubuque Street will be essentially abandoned |
| 20 | and a sidewalk be put down on the east side basically |
| 21 | over the old northbound lane. That would mean that |
| 22 | my garage will not be buried. |
| 23 | However, my question is that low place, |
| 24 | which always floods and receives runoff from Ridge |
| 25 | Road from up on the north end of Dubuque Street comes |
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| down there. And as I understand it there's not going |
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| to be an elevation raise there. How is the runoff |
| going to be dealt with in that low area on the east |
| side of North Dubuque Street between essentially |
| Ridge Road and Foster Road? |
| MS. CLOW: If I understand you you're |
| talking about the drainage ditch that runs along |
| Foster? |
| MR. PEARSON: No. On your side? |
| MR. COULTER: On my side that always |
| floods, that floods first where the culvert is. |
| MS. CLOW: Along Bjaysville. That's a |
| detail we're going to decide during final design. We |
| have talked about sliding the ditch on the west side |
| over with the roadway so we would maintain that |
| culvert under Dubuque Street. And so that's one |
| option is to maintain the ditch. Or we could close |
| it in a box culvert and take it out that way. |
| MR. PEARSON: A lot of that drainage detail |
| still needs to get worked out during design, but what |
| we're trying to do is not just solve the flooding |
| problem from the river but also from the problems |
| that you describe. So there is a lot of drainage |
| study that still needs to be done to get that water |
| out of there and not cause that flooding. |
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| 1 | MR. COULTER: And as many of you know who |
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| 2 | live there, in fact much of the water actually comes |
| 3 | from the river and it is coming back under the road |
| 4 | and that's why the water comes up there. And then it |
| 5 | doesn't matter how high the new Dubuque Street |
| 6 | Roadway is, if that's still a low place that's still |
| 7 | going to receive river backflow into there. |
| 8 | MS. CLOW: Right. That's exactly right. |
| 9 | That is one of the biggest drainage problems is that |
| 10 | at the Dubuque Street/Foster Road intersection the |
| 11 | grade of the drainage ditch is about equal to the |
| 12 | normal water elevation of the river. So anytime |
| 13 | there is high water in the river, it backs up through |
| 14 | the ditch all the way to that intersection. So that |
| 15 | is one of the hydraulic challenges Mark was just |
| 16 | talking about that we will be looking in to during |
| 17 | final design. |
| 18 | MR. JONES: I am Douglas Jones, I live at |
| 19 | 816 West Park Road. |
| 20 | During the flood of 2008 I was my garage |
| 21 | floor was about 12 to 18 inches above the high water |
| 22 | mark, so it was very close to being inundated. |
| 23 | During the flood I walked down and took a number of |
| 24 | pictures at the Park Road Bridge. And I have |
| 25 | pictures of a white water rapids pouring over Park |

| 1 | Road on the west side of the bridge that illustrates |
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| 2 | the amount of water that bridge held back. |
| 3 | It was really acting as a dam. And that dam is part |
| 4 | of the reason the water was as close to my house as |
| 5 | it was. So I'm really very strongly endorsing the |
| 6 | elevation of Park Road Bridge and the creating of a |
| 7 | much wider clear channel there so that the bridge |
| 8 | won't act as a filter to sieve out all the debris |
| 9 | floating in the water and build, what people who |
| 10 | worry about drainage, call a debris dam. We came |
| 11 | very close to damming the river with all the crud |
| 12 | that was sieved out after the water by the railings. |
| 13 | As to the elevation of Dubuque Street, I |
| 14 | think for the good of the city as a whole it is |
| 15 | absolutely essential. We just can't have closures of |
| 16 | major access roads to this town during every single |
| 17 | high water event, and that's where we have been in |
| 18 | the last decades with flooding. We need secure, |
| 19 | ready access to Iowa City from the north and we can't |
| 20 | handle shutdowns there. |
| 21 | When I look at the alternatives, we went |
| 22 | through three different preliminary alternatives |
| 23 | before this particular outline of the plan was |
| 1 | |
| 24 | decided on, and this is far more sensible looking |

1 really coincides with what I thought looks sensible 2 when I looked at those alternatives. And so I really 3 would like to see it go ahead. 4 MR. SOBOCINSKI: I'm Mike Sobocinski, I 5 represent the Phi Delta Theta Household Association. 6 We are technically the landlords for the fraternity 7 house at 729 North Dubuque Street. 8 We're always at -- it seems like we're 9 always giving up something for city projects. We 10 have always worked with the city. My concern this 11 time is the elevation change to Dubuque Street 12 because it will impact our driveway access which is 13 at Brown Street. During the last improvement of Dubuque 14 Street we gave up property traits and property and 15 16 improved our access. I do not want to see it get any 17 worse because it is a -- it is difficult enough to 18 get in and out with good weather, bad weather, sight 19 line distance, everything. So I would hope we could 20 enter into discussion in to how it is going to affect 21 our property because we are in the valley and we're 22 willing to talk, we just want to make sure we don't 23 lose anything. 24 We have owned the property for -- our 25 organization has owned the property for 90 years,

| 1 | since it was a public quarry, so I believe that makes |
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| 2 | us the oldest existing owner of the stretch at this |
| 3 | point in time. And I did keep the water out of the |
| 4 | building in '08, so I have signed in, so I would |
| 5 | appreciate being brought in to the mix with the |
| 6 | design issues. |
| 7 | MS. CLOW: Yes. And just so you know it is |
| 8 | definitely our intention, once we get in to those |
| 9 | final design details with adjacent properties, we |
| 10 | will be talking to you about our plan and what we |
| 11 | will do to improve the property. It is our intention |
| 12 | to look at all these access points and improve what |
| 13 | is there already with this project. |
| 14 | MR. TOBIN: My name is Sean Tobin, I live |
| 15 | at 207 Black Springs Circle. |
| 16 | And I am just curious, this is less |
| 17 | critical to the economic access on Dubuque Street in |
| 18 | and out and the flooding and homes and so forth, but |
| 19 | has consideration been given to the waterway passage |
| 20 | through the bridge? |
| 21 | So primarily there is a I'm a former |
| 22 | rowing coach and an enthusiast of rowing myself, but |
| 23 | there's two-way traffic and so there are rights of |
| 24 | way heading up and downstream and it becomes |
| 25 | problematic for two reasons: One is that the spread |
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| 1 | of oars in both directions require, in order to not |
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| 2 | collide with the bridge abutments, there needs to be |
| 3 | adequate room to be able to navigate. And if there's |
| 4 | three pillars, which is better than the pillars that |
| 5 | are currently in place, depending upon where they're |
| 6 | positioned relative to the shoreline, they could |
| 7 | either they could in effect inadvertently narrow |
| 8 | the traffic channel if they are away from the |
| 9 | shoreline but not in enough to allow a passage lane |
| 10 | to the outside, as well as allowing for passage to |
| 11 | the inside. |
| 12 | So that said but I'm sure there is a lot |
| 13 | of expenses that go in to different bridge designs, |
| 14 | but certainly a single pillar is fewer obstacles, two |
| 15 | pillars might allow a central passage as well as two |
| 16 | outer passages. |
| 17 | But I don't know I know that and I'm |
| 18 | not speaking on behalf of the University of Iowa or |
| 19 | the Athletic Department or Iowa City Recreation, but |
| 20 | I know all of those parties are out of town or they |
| 21 | have changes in roles so there may not be a |
| 22 | representative here to convey those concerns. |
| 23 | So primarily it is just if there's going to continue |
| 24 | to be that access to the waterway then maintaining |
| 25 | safe traffic channels is important. |

| 1 | I also was very concerned when the flood of |
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| 2 | '93 happened, to the gentleman that is familiar with |
| 3 | the fraternity, it seemed like the way the |
| 4 | orientation of those bridge abutments, it just |
| 5 | pointed the water right smack down at the fraternity. |
| 6 | And it was it seemed like it resulted in a |
| 7 | tremendous amount of erosion on the eastern shore |
| 8 | while silting in the river on the Hancher side. So |
| 9 | it seems to me that obviously being in line with the |
| 10 | approaching water as it is coming downstream seems to |
| 11 | make sense to not create resistance and then just let |
| 12 | it flow out wherever, but I don't know, some kind of |
| 13 | orientation. |
| 14 | Obviously it would probably be |
| 15 | perpendicular to the orientation of the actual bridge |
| 16 | orientation, but I guess just the effect it has on |
| 17 | receiving the water and pointing the water, that |
| 18 | whole corner is on a very steep bend so the water |
| 19 | wants to go to the outside and erode to the outside |
| 20 | anyway. And so as long as so I'm just wondering |
| 21 | how the bridge might magnify that dilemma or minimize |

| 23 | backwater, but |
| 24 | MS. CLOW: As far as your first question |
| 25 | with the rowing team, that has been in our |

discussions the whole time and we've had communication with the university and we want to make sure that where we place our piers will not hamper their operations. Obviously we have a great boat house right there and we just want to enhance what they already have there and hopefully give them the opportunity to have more events.

8 MR. PEARSON: And in regard to your second 9 question about the hydraulics, a lot of that analysis 10 is going to happen over the next year so that the 11 piers get lined up in the river both to avoid causing conflicts with the river traffic but also to be as 12 13 efficient as possible with the river channel and not 14 cause any resistance. And we can go in to a lot of 15 detail, but the net effect is that we don't want to 16 create any backwater or contribute to destabilization 17 on either side, so a lot of that analysis will be 18 conducted over the next few months.
